

Black Walnut

Toxicity

Black Walnuts are useful trees for the home landscape, grown primarily for shade, but also for wood and nuts. However, the Black Walnut produces a substance called hydrojuglone, which oxidizes into a toxic chemical called juglone. This chemical inhibits the growth of certain nearby plants, reducing competition for the Black Walnut. Plants that are susceptible to this toxic effect yellow, wilt, and die. Therefore, it becomes very important to choose the right location when planting the Black Walnut, or to choose carefully which plants to put near an established Black Walnut tree. The toxic zone from a mature tree occurs in a 50' to 80' radius of the trunk

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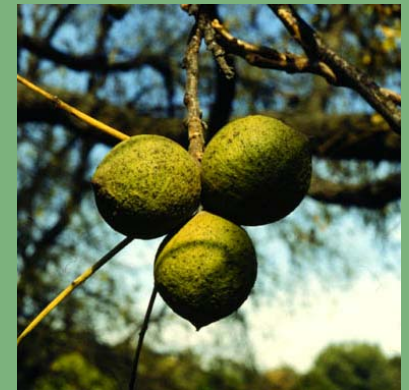
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
